
LEVEL 3 according to DSM-V REQUIRE VERY SUBSTANTIAL SUPPORT.

That's why I created this for you to give your child who are in level 3.

I put some notes for you to follow so you would know how to give your child this worksheet and how to use it.



Here are guidelines to remember when giving these worksheets:



This worksheet may look simple because they are only shapes. It doesn't even have Name or Grade Level that they have to write on. This is because Level 3 needs very easy, concrete, specific, clear and understandable worksheets.

Giving them plenty of words on a paper may confuse them because of too many lines to look at.

Your child may need hand-over-hand assistance if he has difficulty holding a pencil.

Do not give a pencil for matching as it may not be his level. Find fat markers or thick crayons to help your child.



Your child may not be able to do this as it is worksheet or paper-based. However, you can print and cut out the shapes and paste it on a cardboard. Let your child hold and feel the shape and guide his hand to take the same shape.

Colored shapes are easier than black ones. You may give your child easy ones first and move up to black if he is able to match without your help. You may give your child black and white worksheet also and move down to colored if you find it hard for him to match on his own.



Full coloured shapes are easier than lines. You can follow #4 for the level of difficulty.









Do not give all in one sitting if you find your child fidgetting. You can do it in another time.

























































































































































I hope you are able to teach your child with these simple worksheet.
